Kimberly Alexander has made an exceptional contribution to learning and teaching by building an empowering culture of peer connection and career readiness in the capstone year of QUT's Nursing degree. As unit coordinator, Kim led her team to redesign the curriculum and create an innovative, active learning environment. Tutorials

now prepare graduates for real world contexts of cancer, palliative, neurological and renal specialist nursing care. Students collaborate to enact real-world case studies in a supportive environment, assume nursing roles and responsibilities, encounter contextual complexity, prioritise treatment options, and coordinate patient care. Her teaching innovation has had a powerful impact on learning and the profession.

Dr Ruth Bridgstock

Ruth Bridgstock has demonstrated sustained commitment to creating outstanding learning and teaching experiences that enhance creative industries students' engagement, learning outcomes and employability. In her five years with the Creative Industries Faculty, Ruth has led several nationally funded research projects investigating

aspects of the creative workforce, creative entrepreneurship and creative professional learning, and has worked tirelessly to infuse findings from this research into CIF programs. In so doing, she has designed innovative and evidence-based learning experiences using social media, real world practitioner and enterprise case studies and enquiry-based, social learning approaches. Ruth is a generous and inspirational leader, and is strongly committed to transformational learning through the empowerment of students and staff.

Professor Peter Corke

Professor Peter Corke joined QUT and established the Cyphy Robotics Lab at the beginning of 2010. After three years, the lab is one of the most competitive robotics teams in the world, demonstrating Peter's outstanding work quality and distinguished leadership. QUT Cyphy Lab has a vast number of on-going projects,

including: smart manufacturing, construction, smart agriculture and environmental monitoring. In 2013, with concerted efforts between Peter and his colleagues, Cyphy Lab was named to lead a new ARC Centre of Excellence in Robotic Vision. This has generated funding of \$19 million, and opportunities to cooperate with numerous partners at home and abroad, including the University of Adelaide, ANU, Monash University, Oxford University and Imperial College. Peter also exerts a significant research impact in robotics.

Associate Professor Fiona Coyer has been at the forefront of implementing flexible, workplace-based learning activities and assessments, innovative work-integrated learning models and professional support programs for clinical lecturers at QUT since 1998. She has established a unique industry collaborative partnership, the Intensive Care

Professorial Nursing Unit at the RBWH, where she works with clinical teams to integrate teaching, research and practice. Fiona received an ALTC Citation for Outstanding Contribution to Teaching and Learning in recognition of this work. In her various roles in the Faculty of Health, Fiona has also directly contributed to consistently positive undergraduate and postgraduate student course experiences. Most recently, she led an innovative change to mid-year entry in the Bachelor of Nursing that promotes teaching efficiencies by reducing the repeat of core nursing units and enabling academic opportunities for learning and teaching reflection, quality improvement initiatives, and scholarly learning and teaching research.

Professor Jan Recker is the role model for a rigorous real world academic. Using advanced analytic methods and innovative approaches he has made a significant impact on the strategic goals and operational excellence of QUT's industry partner, Woolworths. Jan has managed and actively conducted a number of high impact

initiatives in his role as the Woolworths Chair in Retail Innovation. These have resulted in high quality publications and additional opportunities, including a CPE course on innovation for the top 200 executives of Woolworths. Jan's approach to collaboration yielded both multi-million dollar business benefits and academic achievements such as papers, student projects, PhD scholarships and international collaboration with other universities. Overall, Jan has created a much admired template for the successful management and execution of an industry-funded Chair.

Over many years, Dr Greg Timbrell's teaching evaluations have consistently been in the excellent range, with some students according him 'heavenly' status via qualitative feedback.
